



Today

ECU is developing tomorrow's leaders today by preparing students with 21st-century skills to meet present-day challenges and build a brighter future, transforming our region and beyond through our research, creative activity, innovation and public service.

- ECU is a large public doctoral university with a primarily residential undergraduate student body and a community engagement designation.
- ECU has a professional dominant graduate education profile and expansive opportunities for undergraduates.
- ECU is home to a rich Division I athletics tradition and thriving fine arts programming that provide opportunities for student engagement and holistic development.
- ECU is the only UNC System university with a medical school, dental school and college of engineering at the same institution, the synergies of which provide a dynamic for biotechnology innovation and entrepreneurship.



Campus Facts

- More than 6,500 faculty, staff and graduate assistants worked together to support ECU in 2022.
- ECU consists of approximately 1,617 acres, with 396 of those on Main Campus and 214 on the Health Sciences Campus.
 - 14.8 acres comprise eight dental medicine community service learning centers
 - 129 acres at the North Recreation Complex
 - 650 acres on West Research Campus
 - 213 acres at the Coastal Studies
 Institute in the Outer Banks
- 219 facilities are utilized in support of daily operations.
 - 186 state-owned buildings and 33 leased facilities (January 2020)
- Total core expenses were in excess of \$875 million in 2021.



Building the Future

Celebrating its third anniversary in January 2022, the Main Campus Student Center is the living room for the student population. The facility is home to dining, Dowdy Student Stores, the Dr. Jesse R. Peel LGBTQ Center, cultural centers, lounges, study rooms and a gaming center. The 220,000-square-foot center is LEED certified and received the 2019 Award for Excellence in Structural Engineering from the Structural Engineers Association of North Carolina.

Also designed to meet LEED standards, the 75,000-square-foot Health Sciences Campus Student Center provides recreation and wellness space, dining options, and study and meeting rooms. The Health Sciences Campus Student Center opened in 2017 and is one of the few stand-alone student centers on a health sciences/medical campus in the country.



The Life Sciences and Biotechnology Building (pictured above) opened in December 2021. The \$90-million, four-story building with over 141,000 square feet of space is the new home of the Department of Biology and ECU researchers.

The Isley Innovation Hub is a 14,500-square-foot building where industries and students will collaborate on product innovation and entrepreneurship.





Our Home

Greenville is widely recognized as the thriving cultural, educational, economic and medical hub of eastern North Carolina. While retaining our Southern charm and hospitality, Greenville has grown into the 10th-largest city in the state and is now a thriving, small metropolitan city of nearly 100,000 in the heart of Pitt County.

Located close to ECU's Main Campus, a vibrant uptown district is home to diverse art, music, food and festival offerings and features an increasing number of unique, locally owned businesses, galleries, shops and restaurants. Greenville is centrally located in eastern North Carolina, a region whose coastal environment provides a backdrop for tourism, water sports and wildlife viewing. The Outer Banks to the east can be reached within a few hours' drive, and Raleigh to the west is a couple hours away.

Life on Campus



Crowdfunding Campaign

The first-ever LGBTQ crowdfunding campaign was conducted in celebration of the 10th anniversary of the Dr. Jesse R. Peel LGBTQ Center. The campaign set a record for the university, raising just over \$36,000 (against an original goal of \$15,000).

First-Generation Students

ECU has received the First-Gen Forward designation, a national honor for commitment to first-generation student success. The Center for First-Generation Student Success, an initiative of NASPA and The Suder Foundation, announced the 2020-21 cohort that included ECU. Selected institutions receive professional development, community-building experiences and a first look at the center's research and resources. Through this opportunity, ECU will continue to improve experiences and outcomes for first-generation students.

Wellness Hubs

The Financial Wellness Hub provides financial education, coaching and resources that empower our students to make better decisions, foster better relationships and build better communities.

The ECU Well-Being Hub allows students and staff to discover the five elements of well-being (career, social, financial, physical and community), explore resources to help one thrive, and live a healthy lifestyle full of purpose, resilience and vitality.

Maximize Student Success

Student engagement continues to grow on campus with 375* official student clubs and organizations.

VIRTUAL ENGAGEMENT

Programming in 2020-21 shifted to a virtual format utilizing platforms such as Instagram Live, Facebook, Microsoft Teams, Webex and Zoom.

PARENT AND FAMILY GRANT PROGRAM

Provided by an engaged group of parent-donors, the Parents Fund Grant Program awarded \$8,000 to supporting programs across campus working to support students. A committee of parent-volunteers read applications and decided where the funds should be allocated.

Student Centers

The Main Campus Student Center is a 220,000-square-foot facility that is home to Dowdy Student Stores and other retail spaces, a 14,000-square-foot-ballroom, the Black Box Theater, the 24-foot-by-42-foot Pirate™ Vision digital display, six dining options, the Dr. Jesse R. Peel LGBTQ Center, the Ledonia Wright Cultural Center, a gaming center, multiple lounges and study rooms, and more.

The 75,000-square-foot Health Sciences Campus Student Center is the first stand-alone student center on a medical campus in North Carolina, as well as one of the few in the United States. This multipurpose facility houses various student services, activities and a full-service recreation and wellness center.



Campus Living and Dining Services

ECU is home to 16 residence halls in three distinctive campus neighborhoods; 19 living learning communities; and more than 25 dining venues from dining halls to food trucks.



Recreation Centers

The Richard R. and JoAnn M. Eakin Student Recreation Center on Main Campus is a 150,000-square-foot facility with six basketball courts, a rock-climbing wall, an adventure center, indoor and outdoor pools, a weight-and-fitness area, an indoor track, three racquetball courts, three multipurpose studios, an athletic training facility, and multiple zones designated for health of body and mind.

The Health Sciences Campus Recreation Center provides 25,000 square feet of recreation and fitness space. The two-story open-concept facility accommodates a variety of athletic activities, lectures, banquets and other events. Offerings include small-group training, group-fitness classes, functional cross-training, intramural sports and special-event reservations.

Recreational Complexes

The North Recreational Complex, located 10 minutes from Main Campus, features eight multipurpose activity fields, a challenge course, trails, six acres of water for fishing and boating, a sand beach, fitness equipment and more.

The Blount Recreational Sports Complex is home to intramural and club sports, some challenge course groups and special events.



ROLE OF THE VICE CHANCELLOR FOR STUDENT AFFAIRS

Senior Leadership

The Division of Student Affairs is one of five divisions at East Carolina University. The vice chancellor for student affairs reports directly to Chancellor Philip Rogers and serves on the Chancellor's Executive Council.
